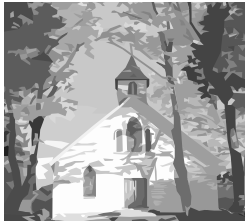

Lead us not into temptation....

Well... no actually do – no one likes to be led into a bit of temptation like I do. In fact I don't have to be led – I can find my own way there quite nicely – Its' about 8 miles down the A41 and its called Bicester Village - and there I can be tempted to indulge in all sorts of unnecessary expenditure on items of clothing that I don't really need. Life in the late 20th and early 21st century is characterised by an endless series of choices – some trivial, some important.

The discipline of Lent is based on Jesus' premature retirement from the carpentry business where he takes 40 days in the desert to prepare for his new line of work. Here he faces certain choices– the first couple of which look pretty trivial. Will he feed himself by turning stones into bread? I would if I was him! This is a personal choice – its not going to affect anyone else. But small selfish choices always lead to large selfish choices which can only lead towards self indulgence and away from God.

Lots of our little choices are about showing off. There's much more cache in an M&S carrier than there is in a Tesco one. There's much more street cred in a pair of Nike trainers than in a pair of M&S trainers. A BMW is far sexier than a Skoda. We try to make choices that are aggrandising and raise our status within our chosen pier group.

And so Jesus' next temptation is seemingly very harmless.

Just show off – jump off the top the church using angels as spiritual bungees – and hey – instant popularity with the right people – you don't have to hang out with a bunch of smelly fishermen – instant access to all the best people. But then it depends of your point of view as to who the best people are and whether life is more than just about popularity. Integrity and popularity are not good bed fellows.

Now for Jesus' last choice. A pretension to world domination; - now that is a serious choice. It's a choice that's wonderfully explored in the Lord of the Rings trilogy. Many good people seek to posses the ring of power because they believe that they could use it and bring about a just world order – failing to realise that they would ultimately become tyrants in the process. Like Frodo, Jesus rejects power because it can only corrupt.

But then perhaps most of us don't want dominion over the world – but we do want it over our bit of it – if only to make sure that others don't get dominion over us. Now if I indulge in a merchandising opportunity proffered by a purveyor of fine shoes this probably doesn't matter much. But there are other choices we make that do matter. And if we are in influential positions in the world of commerce or research or medicine, then our choices can have vast consequences.

Lent is a time when we are challenged think carefully about our choices – whether they are small selfish ones or choices about actions which deeply affect the lives of others. So never mind giving up chocolate – use lent as a time to reflect on your choices and how you could make life better for others by making better choices.

Green Scene – The heat is on

At long last climate change really has become a political football, but politicians are tending to keep the ball in the middle of the pitch rather than score any goals. Many politicians now acknowledge it to be the biggest threat to mankind. The Kyoto Climate Treaty is the first international sign of hope, placing the responsibility for action with the rich developed nations like the UK. Unfortunately the USA hasn't yet signed it. There is a fear that reducing greenhouse gases will curb economic growth, but this need not be the case (and one must also question whether economic growth to be such a good thing). Greener and cleaner technologies and lifestyles may actually bring more jobs, less pollution and a better quality of life. More importantly, drastic measures are needed to save the catastrophic effects of climate change and enable the earth's species (that includes us) to survive.

Carbon dioxide (CO²) is one of several greenhouse gases. It is released when we burn fossil fuels (oil, coal, natural gas, petrol and diesel) for energy. CO² traps the sun's heat in the atmosphere. To counteract this growth in CO² emissions, we need to see a massive expansion in renewable technologies, greater energy efficiency and cuts in our energy demand.

CO² emissions come from the following sources:

- 26.5% from transport
- 27% from domestic energy
- 46.5% from industrial energy

So here are some ideas to cut your own CO² production:

- **Switch to a green energy provider.** Three such companies are Ecotricity Tel: 08000 326 100 (I use this one), Good Energy Ltd 0845 456 1640, Green Energy UK 01920 486156. You can find them all on the web.
- **Insulate your home.** Start with doors and window seals and then take a look at the possibility of improving roof and cavity wall insulation.
- **Choose well-made white goods.** White goods often have energy-efficient stickers showing which are the most energy efficient (A is best). See www.est.co.uk (Energy Saving Trust) for more information.
- **Use low-energy light bulbs.** These are pretty cheap now especially when bought in bulk and don't leave machines on stand-by.
- **Generate your own power.** You can install solar-powered garden lighting, solar water heaters and solar PV panels. I have just had solar panels fitted on my roof. Micro wind turbines are available, some as small as a satellite dish can be fitted on your roof. Ground source heat pumps are very effective. Grants towards installations are available from Clear Skies.
- **Use your car less and when you replace it go for a more fuel-efficient model.** Did you know that 7 out of 8 4x4s never get driven off road. The best thing about 4x4s is their ability to consume excessive amounts of gas! They spew out 47% more air pollution than an average car and cost a lot more to run.

OVING PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

Since last year we have had a relatively quieter time on the Parish Council with less vandalism and repairs to deal with and fewer District and County issues also. However we have had to prepare for the Freedom of Information Act and various other Government initiatives which now weigh heavily on Parish Council duties.

SPEED LIMITS

The proposed reduction in speed limits around the village is still in consultation with Bucks County Council and we are hopeful of an implementation this year! The Parish Council is also looking at other ways to reduce speed such as one vehicle width sections as outside the British Legion hall in Whitchurch. More news to come on these initiatives.

We have now formally secured funds from a village development which will pay amenity funding to the Parish Council rather than provide public ground on the development. We intend to spend this on the Rec. ground pavilion and are currently considering the best way to improve this facility. Any ideas would be gratefully received.
